Description of the Unit:

Grade Level: 1st+ (can be adapted for older grades)

Objectives:

- To examine the holiday, Columbus Day, from a variety of perspectives. A focus on the perspective of indigenous peoples will be emphasized.
- To critically view the celebration of holidays (could be extended to other holidays throughout the year)

Texts

Krensky, S. (1991). *Christopher Columbus*. Random House: New York.

This book is a controlled-vocabulary text. I chose this book because it provides students a opportunity to read a text about Christopher Columbus. It also provides a stereotypical viewpoint of Columbus. It is the story that most people are familiar with regarding his “discovery of the Americas.”

Yolen, J. (1992). *Encounter*. Harcourt Brace: San Diego.

This book is written from the perspective of the Taino people. These were the indigenous people that met Columbus as he landed. This book provides a window into their culture, as well as perspective. What might have the Taino people been thinking? Feeling? Etc. Interesting in this text is that it provides information on the number of Taino people that were and how many were killed, as well as the fact that there are no full-blooded Taino people today. The story is interesting and will prompt discussion, as well as the pictures. Students could be asked to write a story of their own using just the pictures before a read-aloud. This could be a shared writing.
